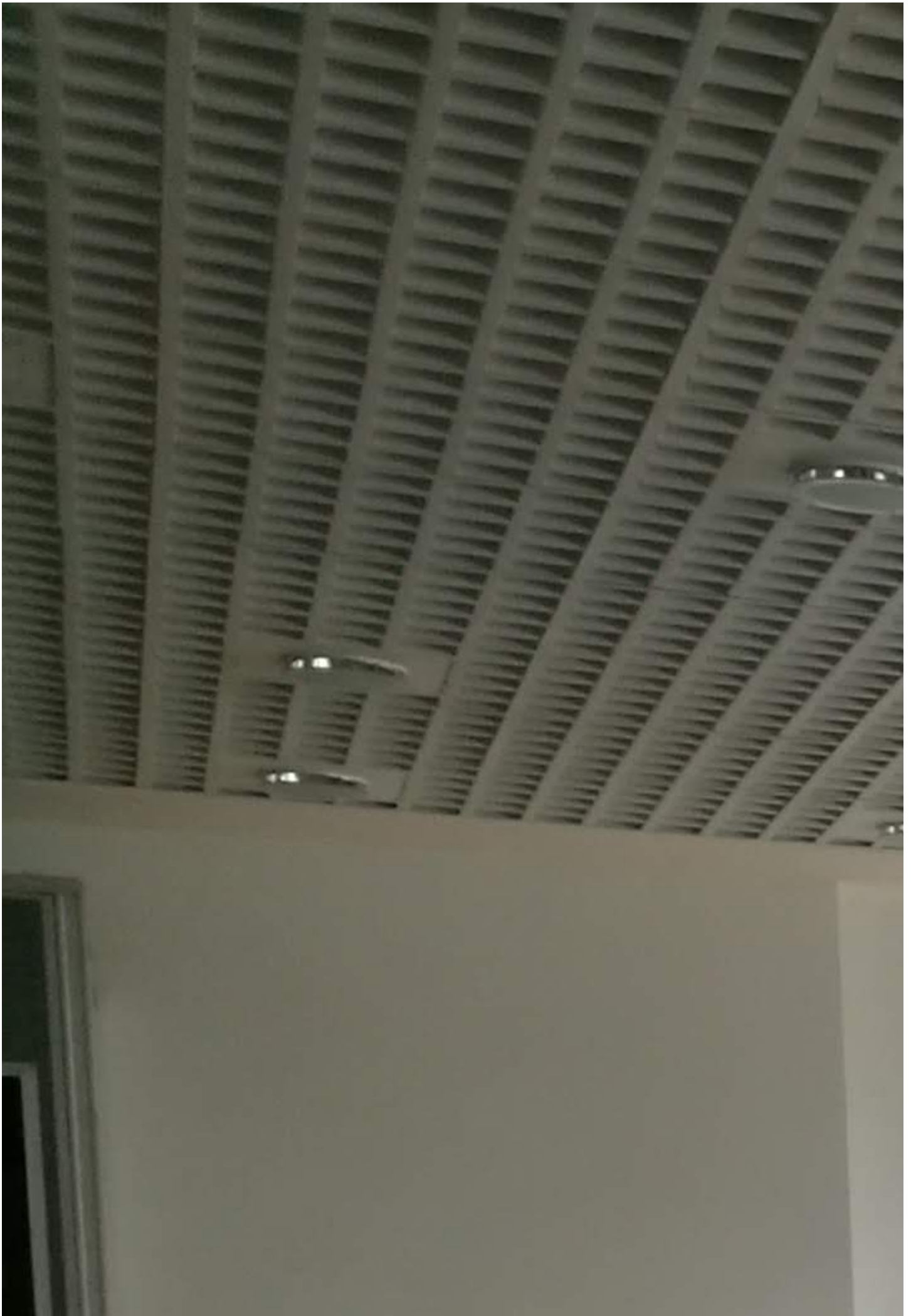


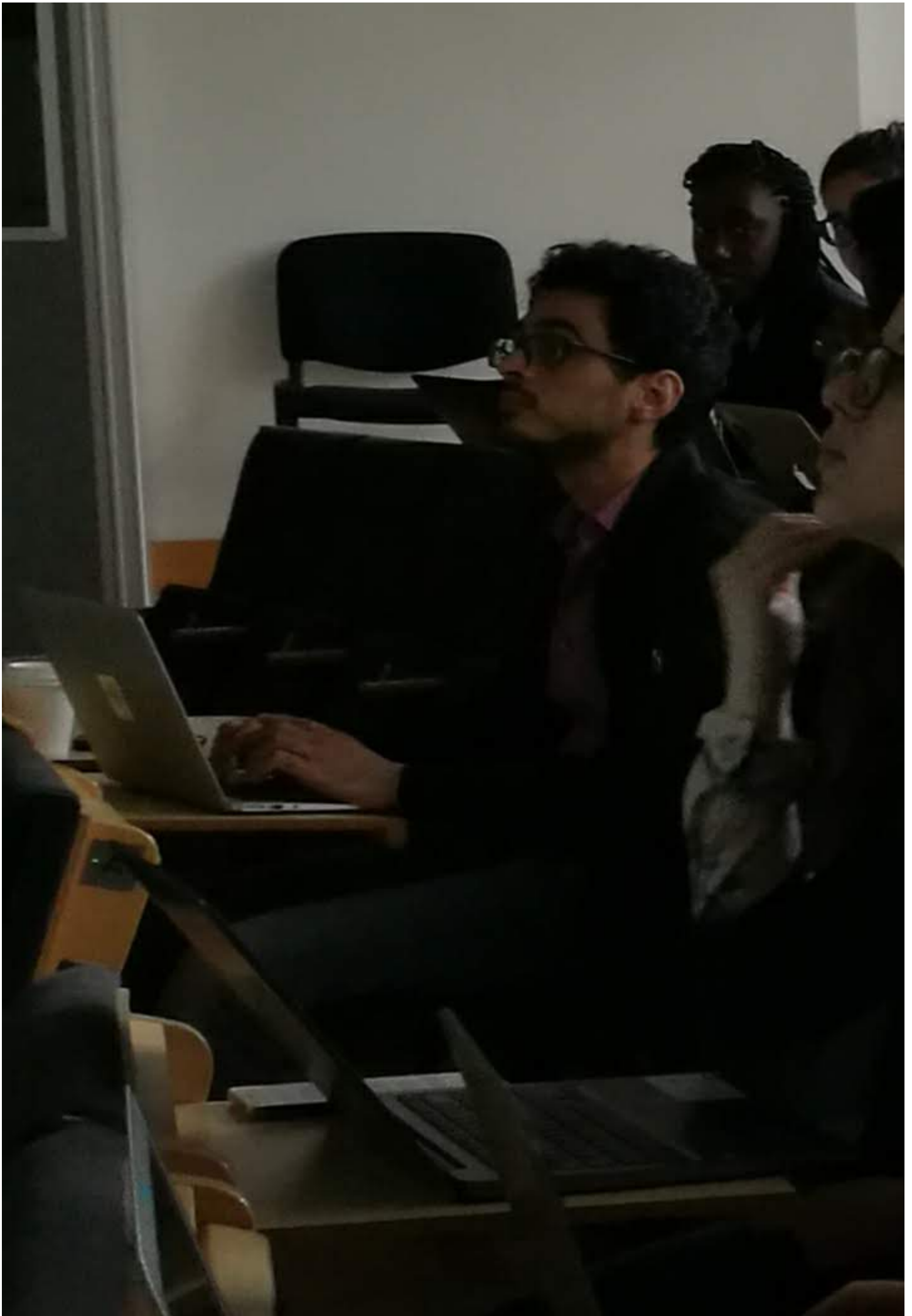


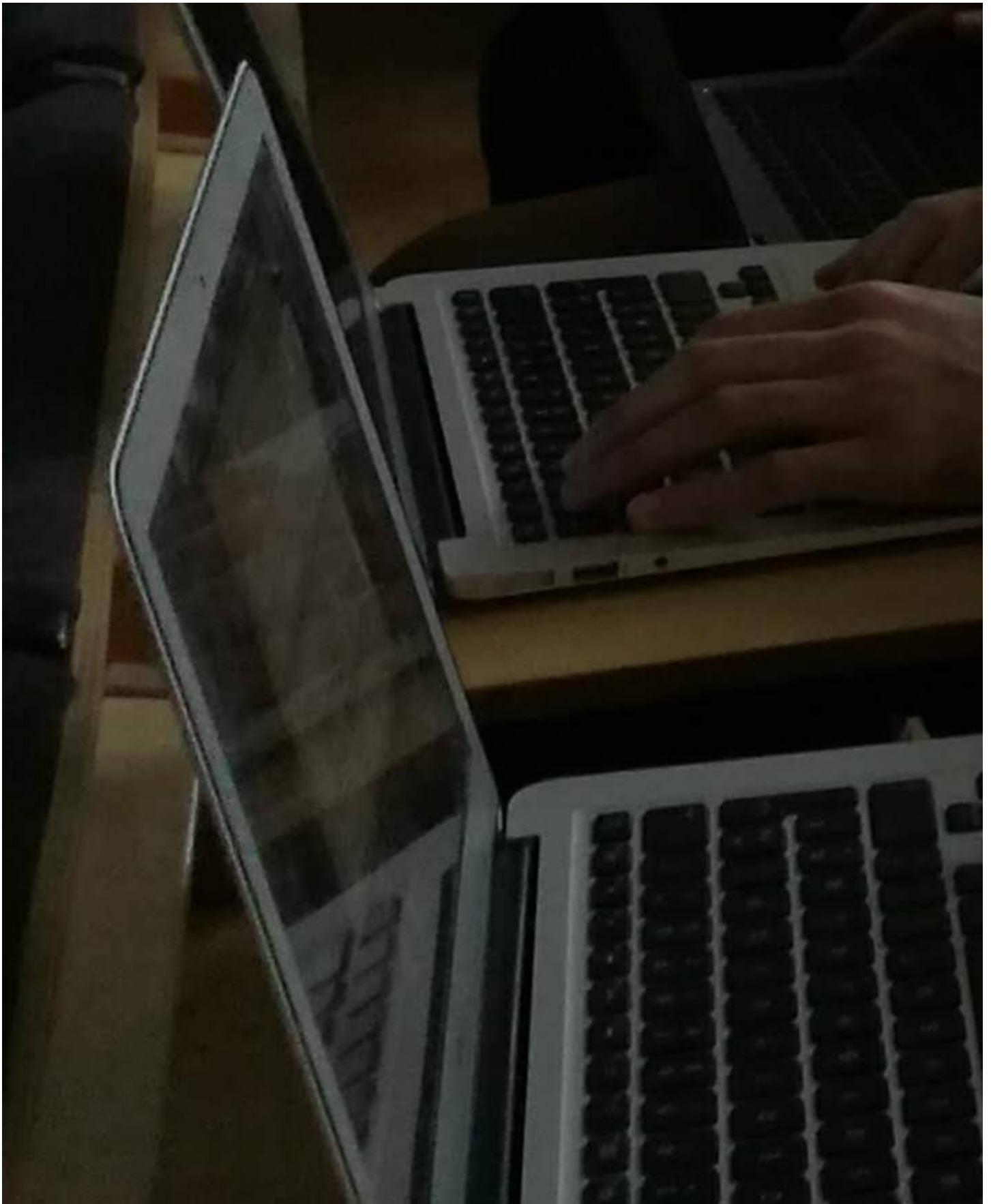
SUMMERSCHOOL IN RIGA, LATVIA, JUNE 2019

This intensive study program took place from the 26th of May to the 2nd of June at the Riga Graduate School of Law, in Riga, the capital of Latvia. The summer school gathered around forty students chosen by the three partner universities, who followed teachings based on two of the courses created in the context of the programme:: "Business and Natural Resources Rights" and "Global Environmental

Litigation".







Course "Global Environmental Litigation"

The course "Global Environmental Litigation" was presented by **Professor Sandrine Clavel, Professor Patrick Jacob and Senior Lecturer Aude Solveig-Epstein.**

Following 1) **An Overview of the Available Procedural Options**, the focus was put on:
2) **Jurisdiction and admissibility issues**, 3) **Procedure-Related Issues** and
4) **Settlements and decisions**.
